Ms. Olmedillo,

You have inquired regarding whether, in accordance with the Florida Sunshine Law, staff may provide members of a County advisory board with informational materials for distribution to other board members.

In general, members of a public board may not communicate privately among themselves, either orally or in writing, on issues that may foreseeably come before the board. However, there is a permissible procedure under the Sunshine Law by which information may be distributed by board members to other members. A board member may circulate, through the clerk of the board, written reports or other information on a subject that will be discussed at a public meeting without violating the Sunshine Law, if prior to the meeting, there is no interaction related to the report among the board members, and the report or other information is maintained as a public record and not used as a substitute for action at a public meeting. AGO 89-23 I suggest that any such communication to other board members come from the clerk of the board and be distributed among all board members, and be made available as a public record to any interested parties. The communication should contain a caveat that members should not respond to the information

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. Such response could be interpreted as interaction among board members in violation of the Sunshine Law. In addition, although this procedure is permissible under the Sunshine Law, it is generally discouraged and should not be engaged in routinely.
