First Clean Campaign Class set for this big election year

Candidates, campaign workers and politically active citizens involved in local elections are encouraged to attend the "Clean Campaign Class" sponsored by the Miami-Dade Commission on Ethics and Public Trust on Wednesday evening, January 27, 2016, in Surfside City Hall.

The presidential campaign may be getting the national attention, but important votes are scheduled in numerous Miami-Dade municipalities during 2016, including (in chronological order) South Miami, Indian Creek, Surfside, Bay Harbor Islands, West Miami, Key Biscayne, Miami Gardens, Aventura, Bal Harbour, Biscayne Park, Cutler Bay, Doral, El Portal, Medley, Miami Lakes, North Bay Village, Opa-Locka, Palmetto Bay, Pinecrest, and Sunny Isles Beach, as well as district, judicial and County-wide posts. All those involved and everyone interested in the process can learn how to properly open and manage financial accounts and run ethical campaigns.

The two-hour seminar, from <u>6:30 to 8:30 p.m.</u>, will feature representatives from the Ethics Commission and the Elections Department who will provide essential information to avoid legal pitfalls, correctly raise and report funds, properly keep records and understand the legal and ethical obligations of seeking public office.

The class is free and open to the public. Attorneys can earn Continuing Legal Education credits from the Florida Bar.
