Hello Michael,

This is in response to your questions about the applicability of the Cone of Silence to the Town of Medley's solicitation for building department services.

- At Sec. 2-11.1 (t)1(c)(i) of the County Code, oral communications are allowed between a potential bidder and the Town Council at duly noticed public meetings. Consequently, the Town's current vendor, who is likely to submit a proposal, may brief the Town Council, as long as the briefing occurs at a duly noticed public meeting.
- 2. At Sec. 2-11.1 (t)1(a)(ii), a Town Councilmember is specifically prohibited from communicating with Town staff about the RFP process. However, this prohibition does *not* apply to oral conversations with the Town Attorney.
